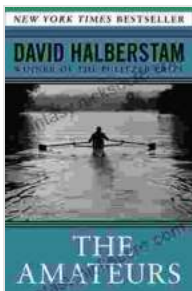


# From Obscurity to Olympic Gold: The Inspiring Journey of Four Unlikely Heroes

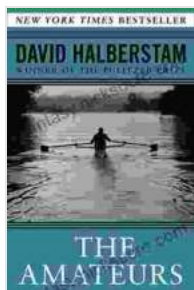
